Raising Champions

Principal's Message: Conquering Sibling Rivalry

I would like to talk with you about helping our children to conquer sibling rivalry. Parents, I encourage you to share this message with your children.

Sibling rivalry is a serious issue among brothers and sisters. Proverbs 17:17 says, "A friend loves at all times, but a brother is born for adversity" (NIV). The challenge for our children today is to be a "best friend" to their brother or sister! It goes against the grain, which means it's not easy to love one's brother or sister, but God can work this breakthrough in their hearts.

In Genesis 25 there were twin boys in the womb of Isaac's wife Rebekah: Esau and Jacob. The Bible says that these boys were jostling each other in the womb. It was as if they were wrestling each other—jockeying for position even in their mother's womb. They had already begun that intense competition so characteristic among siblings. Esau's body was red and very hairy compared to Jacob's smooth skin. Esau was born first with Jacob coming right behind and grasping Esau's heel. Jacob's name meant "he deceives." As they grew up, Esau became a skillful hunter comfortable with working in the open country, whereas Jacob was a quiet man staying among the tents. Their father, who had a taste for wild game, loved Esau. However, their mother Rebekah loved Jacob. Genesis 25:29-34 relates a key event in these brothers' lives:

Once when Jacob was cooking some stew, Esau came in from the open country, famished. He said to Jacob, "Quick, let me have some of that red stew! I'm famished! . . ."

Jacob replied, "First sell me your birthright."

"Look, I am about to die," Esau said. "What good is the birthright to me?"

But Jacob said, "Swear to me first." So he swore an oath to him, selling his birthright to Jacob.

Then Jacob gave Esau some bread and some lentil stew. He ate and drank, and then got up and left.

So Esau despised his birthright.

Esau sold the long-term blessing of his birthright for his short-term desire for food. This passage points out the need for young people to not sell their destiny for the pleasures of this world. It's important to encourage youth to keep in their heart the fact that God has a special plan for their lives and to trust Him for their future blessing—to not give up their destiny for the short-term pleasures of this world.

After the boys had grown older, their father Isaac was getting ready to die. Before he passed away, he wanted to bless his firstborn Esau. He told Esau to go to the open country to hunt some wild game, and then prepare him a nice meal. Then Isaac would give him his blessing.

Esau and Jacob's mother Rebekah were eavesdropping on their conversation. Rebekah proceeded to help Jacob trick his father into giving him his blessing. They came up with a scheme to prepare the meal for Isaac. Jacob, whose name means "he deceives," deceived his father.

After Jacob had successfully deceived Isaac into giving him his blessing, Esau came in from his hunt ready to receive the blessing. Isaac shuddered and realized that he had been deceived by Jacob. Esau was distraught that he missed out on the blessing. As a result of this conflict between the two brothers, Esau developed a grudge against Jacob leading to hatred. Genesis 27:41 says, "Esau held a grudge against Jacob because of the blessing his father had given him. He said to himself, 'The days of mourning for my father are near; then I will kill my brother Jacob.'"

Jesus told of the seriousness of hatred: "You have heard that it was said to the people long ago, 'Do not murder, and anyone who murders will be subject to judgment.' But I tell you that anyone who is angry with his brother will be subject to judgment" (Matt. 5:21-22). Jesus was saying that the heart issue behind murder is that of hatred. Now our child may not consider murdering a brother or sister; however, we need to be sure that he not let anger develop into a grudge or even hatred toward a sibling. Rather, we need to encourage our children to reconcile and forgive one another. Jesus said, "Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to your brother; then come and offer your gift" (Matt. 5:23-24).

Well, Jacob and Esau left home, grew up, became married, and had their own children. However, they still had not reconciled. They still had unresolved issues between them. Fear of Esau grew in Jacob's heart. At one point, Jacob sent a messenger to Esau seeking his favor.

Conquering Sibling Rivalry

We see here that the younger Jacob desired his older brother’s favor. Parents, I encourage you to share with your older children that their younger siblings greatly desire their favor—they want their older siblings to like them! The older siblings may not be aware of it, but younger siblings really look up to them!

Well, the messenger came back to Jacob and said, “We went to your brother Esau, and now he is coming to meet you, and four hundred men are with him” (Gen. 32:6). When Jacob heard that Esau was coming with all of these men, he was filled with fear.

Young people, I strongly encourage you to resolve issues with your siblings when you are young. If you don’t do so, they’ll develop into strongholds of fear in your life. Jacob prayed, “Save me, I pray, from the hand of my brother Esau, for I am afraid he will come and attack me, and also the mothers with their children” (Gen. 32:11). Young person, make it your goal to be best friends with your siblings!

Jacob sent large herds of animals ahead of him as gifts to pacify Esau! As Jacob prepared to meet Esau, he sent his family and his possessions across the ford of the Jabbok. He himself stayed that night on the other side of the river. Jacob, who had wrestled with Esau starting in the womb, that night wrestled with God. Here is their exchange:

When the man saw that he could not overpower Jacob, he touched the socket of Jacob’s hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man. Then the man said, “Let me go, for it is daybreak.”

But Jacob replied, “I will not let you go unless you bless me.”

The man asked him, “What is your name?”

“Jacob,” he answered.

Then the man said, “Your name will no longer be Jacob, but Israel, because you have struggled with God and with men and have overcome.”

Jacob said, “Please tell me your name.”

But he replied, “Why do you ask my name?” Then he blessed him there. So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, “It is because I saw God face to face, and yet my life was spared” (Gen. 32:25-30).

The Bible says that Jacob was limping after he wrestled with God.

Young person, instead of harmful wrestling with your siblings, I encourage you to wrestle with God. As you go through life, you may end up with a “limp,” a condition causing you hardship. When the Apostle Paul was faced with a debilitating thorn in his flesh, he appealed to God three times for it to be removed. God answered in this way: “My grace is sufficient for you; for my strength is made perfect in weakness” (2 Cor. 12:9). That thorn—or limp—may cause you to depend on God.

Young person, I encourage you to wrestle with God. Get your breakthrough with God in order to have the breakthrough with your sibling. Jacob got the breakthrough with God before he received the breakthrough with his brother. Jacob had to wrestle with God and get the breakthrough with him in order to be able to reconcile with his brother Esau. Instead of fighting with your brothers, or even your parents, wrestle with God. Whatever issue you have, young person, don’t make it an issue with your parents, siblings, or teachers. Go to God, go to His Word, wrestle with God, and work it out with Him. Ask God, get your answer from Him, and you will be blessed!

God changed Jacob’s name to Israel, meaning “he struggles with God.” As a result of wrestling with God, Jacob was fundamentally changed. He was no longer marked by deceit. Instead he was now marked by being an overcomer. 1 John 2:14 says, “I write to you, young men, because you are strong, and the word of God lives in you, and you have overcome the evil one.” Jacob—now named Israel—had become an overcomer!

What happened when Jacob and Esau finally met? After wrestling with God, Jacob saw Esau. He now went ahead of (not behind) his family as a godly leader and humbly bowed seven times as he approached Esau. Genesis 33:4 shows their reconciliation: “But Esau ran to meet Jacob and embraced him; he threw his arms around his neck and kissed him. And they wept.” Jacob and Esau had reconciled!

Young people, I encourage you to reconcile with your brothers and sisters. Seek to be best friends with your siblings. Now—while you are young, learn to love your brothers and sisters!

January’s Godly Character Trait: Being a Peacemaker. Parents, I encourage you to pray for your children and the school. (See “Prayer Needs” on page 2). Lift up the students and the teachers as we finish the second quarter, including studying for tests and preparing report cards. Finally, lift up the school during our “Student Champions Fund Drive.” Our goal is to raise \$30,000 to help needy families to partner with us in raising up their children to be champions for Christ!

Please emphasize the character of being a peacemaker with your children this month. Isaiah 9:6 tells us that Jesus Messiah would be called the “Prince of Peace.” In Matthew 5:9 Jesus declared, “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.” Let’s encourage our children to be ministers of reconciliation. In this society where so many are trying to divide people into warring factions, let’s encourage our children to be ones that bring people together—that point people to Christ! Let’s raise up our children to be peacemakers—ministers of reconciliation who bring people to Christ, the Prince of Peace!
